#### THE SCHOOL

Founded in 1796, Oakwood Friends School is a co-educational Quaker school with 160 day and boarding students in grades 6 through 12. Oakwood provides rigorous academic preparation based on primary texts, hands on learning, and an array of experiences in the arts and athletics to encourage creativity, self-expression, conscience, and cooperation. Oakwood Friends School is accredited by the New York State Association of Independent Schools and the New York State Board of Regents and is a member of the National Association of Independent Schools and the Friends Council on Education.

### THE CURRICULUM

Letter grades are assigned A+ through F with D (60%) passing for academic and most elective subjects. All grades, including failures, are reported on the transcript. All classes, including electives, are included when assessing a student's overall performance. Students must complete 19.1 credits to graduate from Oakwood Friends School. One full credit is issued for yearlong courses, 1/3 credit is issued for trimesterlong courses, and .5 credit for Health. Athletic credits (P) are not included in GPA calculations.

The school year is divided into three 12-week trimesters with 60-minute classes. All classes are grounded in critical thinking and discussion. In the progressively challenging college-preparatory curriculum, students are placed according to their ability in mathematics and foreign language as they progress to college-freshman level courses in the senior year.

The intellectual focus of the senior year is challenging interdisciplinary courses taken each term, which are considered history courses for the seniors. The courses are designed to teach students how to abstractly think and draw connections between multiple disciplines. The courses simulate college-level classes and help prepare seniors by using primary texts, applying learning to solve problems, and reading extensively.

#### **SPECIAL OFFERINGS**


- Critical Thinking Requirement Course required for all 9th graders.
- Leadership & Social Justice Requirement Course required for all 10<sup>th</sup> graders.
- Community Service Comprehensive community service program to encourage participation in the wider world. 20 hours required of seniors.
- Global Affairs Certificate Program Available to juniors and seniors by application. Combines current affairs, world languages, political and environmental science, culminating with a capstone project.
- Independent Study With faculty supervision, a student who has achieved independent status may pursue academic study in a particular area of interest that is not included in the regular list of course offerings.
- Libby Moroff Leadership Program Offered annually to a limited number of students who take part in hands-on exploration of issues related to leadership, social justice, civic engagement, and service learning.
- Academic Support Center Provides extra support for students with learning disabilities through Focused Instruction and Learning Skills courses.
- Dual Enrollment Advanced math students are given the opportunity to continue their study of mathematics by enrolling in dual enrollment classes offered through Mount Saint Mary College.
